# **Annual Meeting Minutes**

## 51ST ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES - JANUARY 28, 2018

The Reverend Andrea Taylor called the meeting to order at 9:22 am. There were 102 members present.

Rev. Taylor addressed the parish thanking all the parishioners who serve in making the many ministries of St. David's come to life. She spoke of the Vestry's work on their goal to offer a spiritual encouragement weekend May 4-6, 2019 with Faith Encouragement Ministries. She then invited people forward to dedicate or rededicate themselves as members of St. David's. Five people were welcomed as New Members: Linda Cranmer, Barbara Everett, John Everett, Grace Kelly and Linda Smith, and two were rededicated: David Halvorsen and Jonathan Taylor.

Robin Ward reviewed the minutes from the January 15, 2017 Annual Meeting. It was so moved, seconded and voted to accept the minutes.

Don Blackwell presented the Treasurer's Report and Budget, explaining that our budget is based on the hope of increasing pledge income and improving fundraising events, understanding that with the Mission House renovation project, we will be low on Thrift Shop contributions this year. ## **AUDIT**

The audit of the 2017 fiscal year and financial records took place, at the church, on October 19, 2018. Those present included Donald Blackwell, Treasurer, James Leighton, CPA and parishioner, Elie Swain Harmon, Minister of Finances, and Wendy Katz, parishioner.

This report is submitted to indicate that the Audit for 2017 was conducted, as required by the Diocese. No unusual, or material, issues for findings were found.

It is the opinion of the Audit Committee that the financial books and records, along with policies and procedures related to the Diocesan Investment Trust funds are kept in accordance with the best practices of Diocese.

A formal letter, was submitted to the Diocese after it was approved at the October Vestry meeting.

## **2019 BUDGET**

Estimated income \$325,124.00 (\$30,000 higher than last year) includes an increase in pledges, higher anticipated rental income (based on our new relationship with Epic Events), and a reintroduction of Thrift Shop revenue (\$2,000/month with new basement storage allowing internet furniture sales).

Estimated expenses \$349,979.26 (\$5,000 lower than last year) includes higher anticipated utilities as we reopen the Mission House, but a lower Diocesan Assessment cost and program costs. We anticipate some grant funding to support buildings and grounds.

We project a deficit of \$23,346.26 and point out that we expect to apply 4% of eligible investments including dividends (approximately \$20,000), as advised by Diocesan guidelines, to support operating expenses.

## **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS**

- In addition to the major projects with the Mission House and the Bell Tower, the following projects were undertaken;
- The floors in Nelson Hall were stripped and waxed
- The floor of the kitchen in Nelson Hall was sanded, primed and painted.
- Thanks to a generous donation the refrigerator in Nelson Hall was replaced.
- The Norway Maple was removed from the courtyard.
- Effort was made to fill in some of the pot holes in the parking lot to reduce the amount of water that accumulates.
- The pipes in the attic were insulated to prevent freezing. These pipes have burst in the past.
- Old lawn equipment in the garden shed was inspected and removed.
- Several clean up days were held to clean the grounds along with the interior of the Sanctuary.
- The chairs in Nelson Hall were deep cleaned.
- The brush pile in the corner of the parking lot was removed to aid in drainage.
- Thanks to a generous donation the eaves and window frames on the back of Nelson Hall were scraped, primed and painted.
- The lighting in the main buildings was upgraded to LED's. The bulk of the cost of this project was covered by Cape Light Compact. As a result, we anticipate a significant savings to our monthly electric bill.
- A very special thank you to Roger Parsons for doing the lawn mowing in 2018. He
  did a great job of keeping the lawns looking fantastic all year and saved us a
  significant amount of money.
- Also, thank you to all who helped out with the floors, the chairs and the clean up days. Your work is greatly appreciated by all who visit and attend St. David's.

## CAPE AND ISLANDS DEANERY

The Cape and Islands Deanery meets four to five times a year in one of the 18 parishes and missions on the Cape, Nantucket, Martha's Vineyard, Plymouth, and Wareham. The main purposes of the Deanery are to provide communication between the Diocese and the local congregations and between the local congregations and the Diocese. At each meeting, we hear reports from our Diocesan Council representatives, our Dean, and the Diocesan Staff Liaison.

Our Deanery has a history of being one of the more active deaneries in our Diocese. Although anyone may attend the Deanery meetings, we elect five lay delegates at our Annual Meeting to represent us with our rector (or any clergy in the parishes). Our Diocesan Convention Delegates and Alternate are three of the five, and we try to elect two more lay people from the congregation. Becki Alden and Bernice Winthrop were Deanery Reps for 2018.

January 6, 2019 (2 pm): St. Peter's, Osterville. Topic: Canon Kelly O'Connell, Canon for the Southern Region. Meet and get to know Kelly. The Regional Canons are a new thing for our diocese created by Bishop Gates as a result of our new mission strategy. Regional Canons are helping develop stronger ties between the Diocesan Offices (in Boston) and the local parishes in their respective regions.

## CHURCH SCHOOL

- After our beloved Sonny Gada left St. David's in April, we began a Montessori based approach to religious education.
- **Catechesis of the Good Shepherd** (CGS) officially began in Sept. 2018. Since that time, 12 different children have attended the groups. Their range in age is from 1 year to 13 years.
- Maria Montessori observed that children already have a deep relationship with God and possess an Inner Teacher, the Holy Spirit. Adults do not need to teach so much as guide the child in discovering the mysteries of life
- The Catechist prepares an environment, the Atrium, in which the child may calm herself and receive the most essential elements of God's Word through scripture, liturgy, and practical life. We currently gather in the March Room, and will move to Classroom One, when the Parish Office returns to the Mission House.
- Montessori also believed children learn best through their senses. Everything in the Atrium is designed for children to work with. The child may move freely amongst areas for prayer, scripture, liturgy, art, and practical life.
- The Prayer Table is the focal point of gathering. Children learn to prepare it with reverence and experience private and communal prayer.
- Scripture presentations include prophecies of Jesus, stories of his birth, parables from the Gospels, Psalms, geography of Israel, and stories of Holy Week.
- Liturgical presentations include breakdowns of Baptism and Communion. The Good Shepherd serves a link between scripture and liturgy. He knows every one of his sheep and calls them by name. He feeds them and knows each one's individual qualities and specific needs. He is ever guiding, protecting, healing and forgiving them. His intimate love surrounds them, especially in the Eucharist.
- Practical Life activities build individual and group maturity in physical skills, spatial awareness, confidence, grace and courtesy. Examples include: pouring, separating, carrying, cleaning, designing, plant care, preparation and serving of snacks, washing, and polishing.
- Parents are welcome to visit and observe. We are currently hoping to bring in a secondary Catechist to support the work of our young people in the Atrium and foster the ongoing enthusiasm and wonder of God's joyful journey with each of his sheep.

## **DEACON REPORT**

In Deep Gratitude for a Wonderful Year! The Rev. Marilyn Ayres McMillan, Deacon So many thanks to everyone at St. David's! You so generously nurtured me, as a candidate in formation, during my 2017-18 parish internship here. You so wonderfully celebrated with me in June on my ordination to the diaconate. You so warmly welcomed me back in August to serve my first assignment as a deacon. Who knew a person could float on and be so sustained by your collective hospitality, patience and encouragement? Now I know!

- In our Episcopal churches, deacons are members of one of three distinct orders
  of ordained ministry. The other two ordained orders are bishops and priests.
  Arguably the most important order of our churches are lay people, All of us –
  laity and ordained alike share our commitment to our Baptismal Covenant and
  participate in the worship, ministry, leadership and governance of the Episcopal
  Church.
- Episcopal deacons exercise a special ministry of servanthood, directly under the deacons' bishop, serving all people, especially those in need. Jesus is the model for the servant leadership that a deacon is called to exercise in a variety of ways, especially by encouraging and enabling others to serve. A deacon has one foot in the world and the other in the church. I feel so privileged to be "footed" at St. David's!
- In our Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts, I'm one of about 35 active deacons
  "with permanent vocation" (i.e., different from "transitional deacons" who are
  preparing to be priests.) We're each assigned to serve one parish, in a part-time,
  non-salaried capacity. Assignments are made, typically for three years, in
  response to a parish's formal request for a deacon, which Rev. Andi and the
  Vestry submitted last spring.
- The assigned deacon joins the Rector and other staff of the parish, sharing in the councils and ministries of the congregation and of the whole church, in communion with the bishop. In our diocese, our Bishop Suffragan, the Rt. Rev. Gayle E. Harris, oversees the deacons. Our recently appointed Archdeacon, the Venerable Christian Beukman, assists Bishop Gayle in supporting us deacons. Rev. Chris, for years a valued mentor of mine, plans to visit St. David's one Sunday soon to get acquainted.

One of my favorite things about serving at St. David's is the opportunity to join with so many of you in the wide variety of activities and ministries in which we've all engaged. You can read about many of them in other sections of the Annual Report. Here, let me highlight how much I appreciate our labyrinth, behind Nelson Hall.

- My own affinity for labyrinths goes back decades. I feel so blessed to be able to do personal labyrinth prayer walks here—with both my feet! I urge you to try it.
- It was great to join long-time labyrinth-ers and new explorers, in two Labyrinth Prayer Walks for groups, at Autumn Equinox and Winter Solstice. More to come.

• What fun to discover, with Len's help, photos from 2006 when parishioners, young and older, worked together to create our labyrinth. I'm grateful to all who helped identify most of the folks in the photos.

## **DIOCESAN CONVENTION**

- Diocesan Convention was held on Cape Cod this year in Hyannis! On Saturday, November 3<sup>rd</sup>. (I was pleased that I didn't have to get up at five to drive to Boston.)
- This year, I was once again privileged to serve on the Dispatch of Business Committee, so I was up front, on camera, on the wide screen, making motions to include invitations for speakers during the Convention.
- Everything was moving smoothly until we asked for a motion to pass the Budget for 2019. A surprised motion was made to decrease the expense line item for each of the offices of our bishops (Gates and Harris) by \$33,000. Much time was spent on this, but eventually the motion was "tabled". Then the budget as proposed was passed. We passed the Assessment Budget as proposed, too. St. David's Assessment for 2019 is \$32,689, a decrease from last year of \$895.
- All five Resolutions were passed.
  - 1. The Church's Response to the Opioid Crisis.
  - 2. The Use of Fair Trade Coffee at All Church Events (We do not do this yet.)
  - 3. Supporting Gender Identity Antidiscrimination Laws in Massachusetts
  - 4. Planting a Paris Grove: A Resolution in Support of Creation Care
  - 5. Seeking Immigrant Justice through Accompaniment Advocacy and Direct Action

## **DYECH CARING CARDS**

St. David's is one of 18 participating churches and banks in the Dennis/Yarmouth area that make up DYECH (Dennis/Yarmouth Ecumenical Council for Homeless Prevention). Our main purpose since the beginning of DYECH in 1994, is to raise funds to be given to Housing Assistance Corporation in Hyannis. They, in turn, distribute the funds to families to make a bill payment, so that they remain in their homes and avoid homelessness. Since 1994 we have given \$1,556,000.00 to HAC (how does one and a half million sound?) The easiest way for us to raise money is through the sale of food and other miscellaneous cards where we receive 5 per cent or more of the face value. Among these cards are Stop & Shop, Shaw's, Dennis Public Market, Peterson's Market, Ring Bros., Whole Foods. Everyone must shop at one of these stores! We also have CVS, Dunkin Donuts, Dairy Queen, Cape Cod Creamery, Starbucks, Subway, Dominos along with the 99, Hearth & Kettle, the Riverway and the Yarmouth House group among others.

Our sales for 2018 at St. David's were \$105,645. This is about what we did in 2017, which is good. Obviously I would like to see these figures increase if more of you would purchase these cards. St. David's contributed around \$5,283.00 to the Homeless Prevention Program at HAC. Remember, we are just purchasing our grocery cards, plus enjoying a meal out! Doesn't that make you feel good???

We sell these cards after both services on Sunday. Stop by our table and select the cards you could use for yourself or for a gift. Remember, the easiest way to end homelessness is to prevent homelessness.

## **FINANCE REPORT 2018**

Serving as Treasurer these past two years has been a wonderful learning experience. I cannot thank Wendy Katz enough for the wealth of knowledge, and experience, that she has been so willing to share. Our Minister of Finances, Elie Swain Harmon, is a "Johnny on-the -spot" gal and always right there, ready, willing and able to provide me with whatever information I have asked. The Parish Administrator, Denise Frost, helps in any way she can, whenever asked.

With a \$58,000.00 deficit looming over us, we put out a plea for fundraising ideas. Joe Miranda suggested a "Finance Parish Forum," which we conducted on August 19th. At this forum many of you increased your pledge and committed to that increase through 2019, others gave a one-time donation. We appreciate this and we thank you. Another suggestion, by Joe, was to host a concert which we did on Friday, Oct 5, 2018. This concert, the Summer Yard Sale, the Church School/Choir Kick Off BBQ and the Christmas on Old Main Street Fair have all helped ease the deficit and we thank each and every one of you who have made these events possible and to those of you who have supported them.

Over the past years, some very generous donations have been made to St. David's and some very necessary projects have been completed as a result. The kindness of the Pond family continues, and by request, we have received, annually, \$25,000.00 from the Pond Fund. This gift, however, is not guaranteed to continue. Your Vestry, and its Executive Committee, has worked diligently to look at the budget, both Income and Expense. Many of our expenses are fixed and those that are not have been kept to a minimum. Our pledge income needs to be addressed and the Stewardship Committee will be doing this. I hope the mini "Treasurer's Report" that is printed on the announcements sheet have been helpful to you in seeing our financial situation on a monthly basis. We continue to solicit ideas for creating income.

The many ministries that take place here at St. David's are critical to the parish and to the greater community. Your support of St. David's and all that it does for the community, by making a pledge, is what will allow us to continue.

## **FOOD BASKET**

The food collected each Sunday is delivered to the Cape Cod Council of Churches "Hands of Hope Food Pantry" in West Harwich. It asks for items frequently requested but not provided free of charge or at reduced prices from the Boston Food Bank. It serves people who meet the U.S. income poverty guidelines and have proof of residence in the towns of Harwich, Dennis, Yarmouth, Barnstable, Mashpee and Sandwich. Participants may visit twice a month and receive three to four grocery bags of food. We received 2,914 food items in 2018.

The second Sunday of each month is "FOCUS SUNDAY". Everyone is encouraged to bring a particular item that day. There were three variations on the Focus Sunday. Two were the Mothers' Day and Christmas collections for "A Baby Center", another Cape Cod Council of Churches' program. It helps mothers in need. These collections which emphasize the need for diapers, brought in a total of 2313 diapers! The third was our "FOCUS FOUR" collection of Thanksgiving Dinner items during the four Sundays before Thanksgiving. We provided 350 food items and \$160.00 worth of Food Cards for turkeys.

Thank you to all who support this important ministry. It is amazing what we can do together!

## MISSION HOUSE - COMMUNITY PRESERVATION GRANT Summary of Project October 1, 2017 - January 4, 2019

## 2017

### **October**

- The property was clear of all furnishings.
- With building empty, it appeared that lifting floors was not an option. Met with architect and contractor to discuss changes in scope of work.

## **November**

- Did a walk-through with building, plumbing, electrical/fire alarm inspectors and architect and contractor to discuss implications of lifting only walls and roof and leaving behind floors for demolition.
- Worked on a revised budget for the project based on new scope of work. With the imminent opening of walls, we decided to get hazardous materials testing.
- Contractor met with Historic Commission. They expected to sign off on the excavation and asked to keep an eye open for any possible archaeological finds.
- Fuss and O'Neill sampled the building for hazardous materials.

## **December**

- Had a draft AIA document ready for review.
- The permit was ready.
- Met with architect and contractor to discuss the need for hazardous materials abatement work, the contract between owner and contractor, and a revised budget.
- Began getting bids on abatement work.

## 2018

## **January**

- Met with architect and contractor to clarify abatement work and pricing of revised contract.
- Third abatement bid came in, so contract could be finalized.
- Received contract for signatures. This version reflected cost changes in lifting 5 sides of structure, leaving floor for demolition, and including hazardous materials abatement. The new language for this was Phase I which would permit us to remain within the funding already available for the project. A Phase II was created for which the church could raise funds for framing, Gypsum Wall Board, insulation, trim and plaster repair resulting from abatement, and items concerning flooring throughout the building, interior and exterior painting, and replacement of bathroom fixtures.

## **February**

- The revised contract was signed.
- New England Surface Maintenance Environmental Services removed walls, ceilings and flooring with hazardous materials.

#### March

 Floors were removed/salvaged, chimneys were taken down, doors, windows, furnaces, plumbing fixtures and other salvageable items have been placed in storage container on site. Siding at base of building got removed to separate building from floors.

# **April**

- The excavator arrived to begin the lifting preparation.
- Iron beams were braced through the house to prepare for lifting.
- Amos Baker House was lifted 40" off the ground.

# May

- The excavators dug out the area for the new foundation.
- The support column bases were poured.
- The footer was poured.
- The basement walls were poured.

# June

- The slab was poured.
- St. David's requested add-on of an interior staircase to the basement. BLFR Architects designed a suitable plan, G. Davis developed an estimate, and St. David's Vestry approved using additional funds raised for stairs.

# July

- The framers began laying out floor joists.
- The structure was lowered to 10" above the LEVEL floor!!
- Framers reinforced walls, prepared structure to line up with foundation and built bulkhead stairs.
- Building was lowered completely onto the new foundation.

# August

- I-beams and extra support boards were removed.
- Framers returned to true up and connect the building to the base. They discovered that two interior walls had fallen of their own accord, two exterior walls had no actual framing or insulation, and several windows had extensive damage (dry rot and weather) to framing and sills, implying additional cost.
- Met with architect and contractor to discuss challenge of window replacements, wall improvements and interior space changes. Learned that during the backfilling process G. Davis discovered that outgoing plumbing was not connected to our septic system, but directed to a cesspit that had collapsed several years back.
- Met with architect and contractor to discuss how to adjust contract and priorities in light of new needs and current fundraising efforts. Decided to go ahead with replacing windows and installing septic tank. Decided to build one wheelchair ramp to south entrance and simplify the interior spaces. There will be fewer small rooms and tight hallways, thus a more open feel. The parish will take responsibility for all flooring, painting (interior and exterior), and all

improvements to second floor dormers (siding and painting).

• Received check to ensure building of interior staircase.

# September

- Framers removed rotten exterior walls, window casings and sills, including aluminum coverings, cleared out the interior walls that had fallen, reframed the altered interior spaces (i.e. dressing room under second floor stairs), and built staircase to basement.
- old cedar shakes were removed and fresh Typar wrap was completed on exterior
- New window framing and windows installed

#### October

- · New cedar siding completed on exterior
- ADA compliant doorways placed between Thrift Shop and Offices and to the lavatory and the rector's office.

#### **November**

- Insulation sprayed into Thrift Shop entrance ceiling and placed into exterior walls
- Insulation covered with plastic and placed in first floor ceilings.
- Fire alarm system rough wired, and septic system installed and covered up.
   Terrraforming done for ramp.

#### **December**

- Sheet rock installed, taped and plastered.
- Ramp framing for concrete begun.

#### 2019

# **January**

- Ramp framing completed and concrete poured.
- Interior walls and ceilings primed.

We presently await the reconnection of the gas line, which has been delayed due to the backlog of hookups after the explosions in Lawrence and N. Andover last fall. Once we have heat, the final plumbing, electric, fire alarm, flooring, painting and telephone/internet work can take place. KEEP PRAYING!! *Rev. Andi Taylor*



#### PAPER PANTRY

Thank you to Bernice Winthrop for leading the Paper Pantry Team for a long time! She resigned in September, and I have tried to "fill her shoes". As Bernice announced in church, we are a "well-oiled machine" thanks to her organizational skills.

Thus year, we have served 482 families, representing 1337 individuals. An average of 40 clients each month, representing an average of 111 individuals (counting children older than 3 years) Our largest families have 7-8 members. The past few months have seen a slight decrease in numbers when compared to last year. We can only hope that this means fewer people need our services, but I fear that the time and/or location is just not matching the need.

We have had 87 "new" families come. Some are referred by the local Food Pantries, some by friends.

We continue to spend about \$500/month for supplies. Parishioners have donated many of the supplies we need including coats, hats, and mittens last December. Our Special Ministries Team continues to support us with grant money.

Richard Banks has been a great help getting a nurse from Barnstable County to come every month. She checks blood pressures, blood sugars, and had flu shots available for anyone who hadn't received it yet. Starting in January, a dental clinic will also be available. Last December, Flower Angels had small bouquets for our guests.

We believe that some other locations for Paper Pantries have been opened. We believe that one has started in Wareham. Others, like St. Peter's, Osterville, may be starting as well. (continued on next page)

#### **RECTOR'S REPORT**

It turned out to be a groundbreaking year in many ways at St. David's. The Mission House Project broke ground May 1 to create a solid foundation for the circa 1790 Amos Baker House. The scope of work grew, as with many historic building renovations, and the congregation rallied together with 65 households raising \$32,225 to see the project through. Our Paper Pantry/Takeaway Meal introduced nursing and dental services to clients. Our Choir welcomed John Read as their new director. Sunny O'Neill began Catechesis of the Good Shepherd with our church school. Our Vestry revitalized our commitment to improve our finances by holding an extra Budget Workshop in August. Our Stewardship Team encouraged a Fall pledge drive that had great results - \$245,224 as of Jan. 4th (\$33,000 higher than last year). We are starting 2019 on more solid ground financially than we have in several years.

I am so thankful to John Hays and Nancy Moyer for leading us in our Faith Encouragement Weekend in May. The Holy Spirit fed all of us and brought a new sense of gratitude for each other. I am especially happy that Debbie and John Hays offered to carry forward the ministry of Healing Prayers during Sunday worship which so many of us appreciated during Faith Encouragement. I look forward to training additional people to offer Healing Prayers.

I am so grateful to be called to serve God with you in this community. Every person at St. David's contributes in their own way, and there are so many ways that people contribute: Food Pantry, Paper Pantry, Takeaway Meal, HAC Cards, Toys for Tots, Flowers, Pot Lucks, Healing Prayers, Yard Sale, Christmas Fair, Cookie Stroll, House Church, singing, visiting, driving for each other, knitting, raking leaves, mowing lawns, making coffee, cleaning chairs, polishing floors, "swiffering" spider webs, polishing silver, trimming wicks, collecting quarters, leading reflections at Habitat for Humanity, hosting workshops, writing checks, going on field trips, planning education forums, stuffing envelopes, reading, praying together, proclaiming scripture, preparing budgets, auditing books – ALL of these make St. David's thrive!

I look forward to building our reputation as a welcoming parish as we strive this year to host more "Bring a Friend" days and nurture newcomer involvement. In January our Indaba Team started building relationships with St. Paul's, Bedford and St. Andrew's, Wellesley to broaden our understanding of mutual ministry. In June Bishop Alan Gates will visit us during an Indaba weekend and offer Baptism, Confirmation, and Reception. I am curious what the Holy Spirit has in store for us as we become better stewards of ourselves and servants of others.

# SOCIAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

This newly-formed and evolving committee began as a result of our participation in the Faith Communities Environmental Network (FCEN) of Cape Cod. This group is a branch of the Cape Cod Climate Change Collaborative, a Cape-wide campaign to unite the varied expertise and experience of Cape Cod organizations to address the impacts of climate change.

We wanted to raise awareness of climate issues at St. David's and hosted two "dinner and a movie" showings of the movie "Before the Flood" by Leonardo DiCaprio. These were well-attended and as a result we added more committee members.

We plan to host an Environmental/Spirituality and Science forum for the parish and community in April of 2019.

Our committee now meets regularly on the second Tuesday of each month and have widened our scope to include racial and immigration justice as well as environmental justice. We hosted an educational series on Martin Luther King's letter from Birmingham Jail. Later in the year, we toured the Zion Union Heritage Museum in Hyannis to learn more about the Cape's diverse history. In addition, we had a forum on immigration issues on the Cape and plan to continue these efforts.

We are exploring the feasibility of solar panels and have three proposals from solar energy providers, and one more is expected soon. Each solar provider will meet with the Buildings and Grounds committee over the next few months to help determine our best options going forward.

- Here on Cape Cod, we contributed to the local chapter of the A Baby Center, AIDS Support Group of Cape Cod, Alzheimer's Support Group, Amazing Grace, American Red Cross, Angel Flights/NE, Cape Abilities, CC Times Needy Fund, Champ Homes, Duffy Health Center, Flower Angels, Habitat for Humanity of Cape Cod, Homeless not Hopeless, Homes for our Troops, Housing Assistance Corporation, Howard Masonic Lodge Angel Fund, Independence House, Katelyn's Closet, Samaritans, Sight Loss Services, St. David's Paper Pantry, Takeaway Meals, THRIVE, WE CAN, Women of Fishing Families, Yarmouth Food Pantry, and the Yarmouth Police Relief Association. This year we added Emerald Hollow Therapeutic Riding Center in Brewster.
- Nationally and internationally we were able to help Episcopal Relief and Development, and St. David's Cathedral in Wales.
- The Special Ministries Committee members are privileged to have the responsibility of distributing some of the outreach that St. David's is known for and look forward to continuing the work of the church in the wider community.

#### SPIRITUAL FORMATION

- Spiritual Formation continues to organize special programs for our community. These programs and activities are an integral part of the church's offerings.
- A centerpiece for this year was a powerful 3 day Faith Encouragement Weekend offered in May.

- Saturday Morning Coffees (Coffee with God) was a new addition this year.

- In April, a series of guest speakers spoke on practical matters in our lives i.e.; preparation of a will and the environment. In August, we further explored end-of -life decisions, medical and legal options and how to communicate our wishes to care-givers..
- June found parishioners working on their own spiritual biographies.
- During the summer, we were made aware of the highlights of the General Convention.
- In the Fall, for several weeks, we studied Martin Luther King's *Letter from Birmingham Jail* and the continuing challenges of race relations. The study was concluded with a visit to the Zion Heritage Museum.
- During Advent, we hosted a Quiet Day.
- Marilyn McMillan led Labyrinth walks/potlucks at the Fall Equinox and Winter Solstice.
- We are beginning "A Square Meal" concept for the parish through our balancing of programs which include scripture, art, music, liturgy, and planning for one's future.
- A heartfelt thank you to each member of Spiritual Formation for their efforts throughout the year. We are most appreciative of the ideas brought forth by our Deacon, Marilyn McMillan. We also, thank Geoff Heins and Don Blackwell, who are leaving the committee, for their long-term contributions.

#### STEWARDSHIP REPORT

The highlight of the year was a special Budget Forum and Brunch organized by the Vestry on August 19. Cathy Karras opened with prayer, Joe Miranda explained that his experience at a former parish showed that often parishioners just don't know how much it costs to run a church, and how much their contributions matter. Richard Banks recalled all the ministries that happen here and what incredible VALUE St. David's provides to our greater community. Elizabeth Rixham shared a story in which a man from the Food Bank said, "Of course you have more food to deliver, you are from St. David's!" We have a reputation as a parish that gives and serves in abundance.

The treasurers informed the 80 participants that the weekly cost of providing all these services = \$6,467 while our weekly income = \$5,248. With 115 pledging households in 2018, the average pledge was \$36 /week. Going to an average of \$47 / week would make up the difference. I added that the beauty of being God's church is that we do not tell people what they need to pay to be a member here. We give in the ways that we are called to give. Not all have time, talent or treasure, but we give what we have, and that is what makes this such a Spirit filled place! An energized discussion followed with ideas to use Amazon Smile and organize more fundraisers. Nearly \$9,000 was raised in additional pledges. The ideas for "Bring a Friend to Church Day" in November and a "Welcome Team" evolved from the Budget Forum. The best outcome was the can-do spirit that we all felt when we worked on the financial challenges together!

With thanks to the Vestry, Marsha Fredericks heading up the Summer Fair, Joe Miranda organizing the concert by Sergei Novikov, and Tammy Blackwell heading up Christmas on Main Street- we exceeded our fundraising efforts in 2018. We anticipated raising \$8,000, but raised \$10,369.90!

Thanks also to our newly formed Stewardship Team, Cathy, Karras, Richard Banks, Debbie Hays, Art Taylor, Sue Harrison, Steve Mulligan, and Joe Miranda. Cathy, Art and Sue gave talks at the 8:00 am and 10:00 am services to encourage us to pledge our time, talent and treasure in 2019. The pledges have come in above our initial \$235,000 goal, and are \$245,224 to date.

#### **SUMMER FAIR**

Our Summer Fair earned over \$5,000. in 2018. This includes the bake table (proceeds to Special Ministries), Plant and Garden Table (proceeds to Church School) and the general white elephant tables (proceeds to operating expenses). All remaining items were distributed to a variety of local charities, as well as our own Church School, and Thrift Shop. A dedicated cadre of volunteers kept the entire process running smoothly. #### TAKEAWAY MEAL PROGRAM

During 2018 The Takeaway Meal Program;

- Served 1,624 meals to 544 clients that represented 1, 292 adults, 332 children for a total of 1,624 meals served.
- Invited the Barnstable County Nurse to participate and provide free medical screenings for the clients. Flu shots are also being distributed.
- Dental hygiene services will be provided starting in 2019.
- Individuals also attended who provided advice individuals who might have or know of individuals with immigration issues.
- The Flower Angels distributed flowers at our December meal.
- A coat drive was run at a parishioners place of employment and the coats were also distributed at the December program along with hats and gloves that were donated by parish members.
- A menu book was created that identifies the meals to be prepared each month throughout the year. The book also contains information about attendance and side dishes.
- For the last three months of the year the times for the program were changed to be open from Noon until 2:00 pm. In 2019 we will be reverting back to being open from 1:00 pm to 3:00 pm.
- Each month informational flyers were distributed that were dealing with fuel assistance, housing, summer lunch programs and other similar programs.
- Financial donations were received from The Cape Cod 5, St. David's Special Ministries, The Cape and Islands Deanery, Retired Men's Club of Cape Cod, Members of St. David's.

Thank you to all who volunteered to make/package/distribute the food, provided cookies and brownies, donated items or supported the program with financial contributions.

#### **THRIFT SHOP**


• A motion was made, seconded and carried to move the time for the Paper Pantry and Take Away Meal back to 1pm to 3pm.
