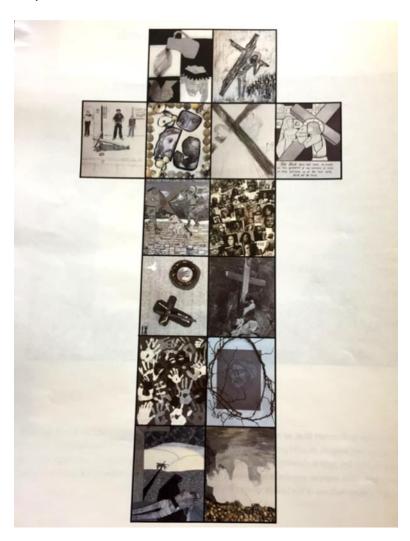

52ND ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES - JANUARY 24, 2019

The Annual Meeting took place during the "sermon time" of our worship service. The clerk noticed the following Vestry members and officers present: Andi Taylor, Marilyn McMillan, Cathy Karras, Richard Banks, Ken Blake, Joe Miranda, Lyn Solomon, Sandi Eldridge, Nick Heaney, Larry Johnson, Steve Mulligan, Elizabeth Rixham, Don Blackwell, as well as herself in attendance. There was a quorum of 109 parishioners present.

The meeting was called to order at 9:18 am.

Rector's Report: In her State of the Parish address Andi drew from today's scripture in Paul's letter in 1 Corinthians to remind parishioners that we are strengthened as a community because we have different talents. She reminded us that what we do "for the stranger, the least of these", we do for Jesus. She reviewed activities that St. David's has supported. And cited our attendance at a Racial Reconciliation workshop at the Cathedral, the Faith Encouragement weekend last May, healing prayer during Communion, and Coffee with God gatherings at the homes of parishioners among other activities. She spoke of changes in our community – the resignation of our Music Director, Maggie Ribb, and the resignation of our church school coordinator, Sonny Gada, and how these resignations brought us John Read and Sunny O'Neill. The addition of a visiting nurse and dental hygienist to the Paper Pantry and Take Away Meal programs also help our greater community. Andi reminded us that our parish serves the greater community by offering meeting space for Twelve Step groups 14 times per week and supports the Nursery School. Her address continued with the ways we have sought to correct our financial tangles with the Budget Forum in August and the Sergei Novikov concert in October. The Stewardship Pledge Drive has resulted in a 15% increase in pledges. We have been strengthened spiritually with Labyrinth Walks and the Lenten series. The Summer and Christmas Fairs were successful. We are looking forward to new ways to enhance worship -- new Stations of the Cross artwork will be up for Lent and training for healing ministers has been scheduled. We also have welcomed new people to our parish family and look forward to an Indoor Family Picnic in February with a Magic Show by Geoff Heins.

Senior Warden's Report: Cathy Karras presented the minutes from the 2018 Annual Meeting. It was moved, seconded and approved to accept the minutes. Cathy also thanked parishioners for their support over the past year. She thanked Andi for her handling of the Mission House Renovation.

Treasurer's Report: Don Blackwell presented the budget for 2019. He indicated that this was a "bare bones" budget. Questions were answered. It was moved, seconded and approved to accept the budget.

Nominating Committee: The slate of vestry members and officers was presented. Junior Warden: Deb Hays; Clerk: Janis Rennie; Treasurer: Wendy Katz; Assistant Treasurer: Colleen Weston; Three year vestry terms: Janet Cardillo, Linda

Cranmer, and Lyn Solomon; Two year vestry term: Nick Heaney; Diocesan Representatives: Becky Alden and Bernice Winthrop. A motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the new slate.

Junior Warden: Richard thanked vestry members (Sandi Eldridge, Elizabeth Rixham, Lyn Solomon) and officers (Cathy Karras, Warden; Don Blackwell, Treasurer; Wendy Katz, Assistant Treasurer; and Bernice Winthrop, Clerk) who were ending their terms and presented them with tokens of appreciation.

NEW BUSINESS

Andi reported that Ann Ierardi is retiring from her work with Taize services and Lenten programs at St. David's.

Roger Parsons was named a St. David's Hero (and a bit of a "church elf") and thanked for quietly mowing and maintaining the grounds all year.

Bishop Alan Gates will be at St. David's on June 23, 2019. Andi will offer Episcopal Faith 101 for those wishing to be confirmed.

The meeting adjourned at 10:40 am, following the Eucharist, and the congregation was invited to Nelson Hall for a slide show and coffee hour.

ALTAR GUILD

Altar guilds today are groups of men and women organized in different ways who are called to serve God by preparing and tending the places where his people worship him. Their work is a thank-offering of time and many talents, a ministry of love undertaken in the name of Christ. *The Altar Guild Book, Barbara Gent and Betty Sturges, 1982*

At the end of 2019, St. David's Altar Guild consisted of fourteen members. Working together throughout the year in teams of three and four, we take turns preparing the altar for the many weekly and special services, such as funerals, baptisms, and weddings. The Altar Guild is mostly a behind the scenes ministry. We sit in the transept during the Sunday Services in case our Priest needs something. A team meets every Saturday morning and before and after services to prepare for the service. We care for all linens, brass, silver and candles and are in charge of ordering the wine and wafers needed for communion.

Last May 30th, our Altar Guild hosted the annual Cape and Islands Altar Guild luncheon. This is a yearly event, held every Ascension Day. All the churches take turns hosting. We had a coffee hour in the March Room followed by an Ascension Day service. We then adjourned to Nelson Hall for a light luncheon and desserts prepared by our Altar Guild members. We had two of our parishioners speak about our Paper Pantry and Take Away Meal Ministries. About 40 Altar Guild members and Priests from the Cape attended.

To get ready for this event, the Altar Guild decided to spruce up the Sacristy. With the help of many, the walls and cabinets were painted. New handles were installed on the cabinets and drawers. The floor was buffed.

As the new year begins we are pleased to welcome two new members to our ministry. More are always welcome. If interested speak to any Altar Guild member before or after a service. It is a very rewarding ministry.

AMAZING GRACE CAMP

St. David's supported campers who attended the 6th annual summer camp for children who have an incarcerated parent. There were 30 students age 7-11 at Camp Burgess and 10 students ages 12-15 at Camp Hayward. Amazing Grace has served a total of 69 children from 58 families since it began in 2014.

Bernice Winthrop and Lyn Solomon volunteered at the camp August 18-23, 2019. Several parishioners helped tie the quilts which were sewn by Bev Parke for each student. We also helped obtain a \$2,660 House of Mercy grant from the Diocese to ensure the ongoing ministry of Amazing Grace.

Amazing Grace leaders continue to expand the commitment to families to include activities with mentors throughout the year. Some of these events are held in Nelson Hall. They seek our support financially as well as in person.

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BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE

We had an amazing crew for our spring and fall clean-up. Thank you to our many behind the scene helpers who help to maintain the property, especially the Halvorsens for all their hard work.

Thank you to Bill and Tammy Lickfield who have been working tirelessly to maintain the memorial yard and herb garden as well as spearhead the creation of a paved walkway to the memorial garden this fall.

Mowatt Landscaping has been doing our grounds this year and we continue with Sears & Sons for plowing.

The committee did some extensive research and had interviewed salespeople regarding installing solar panels on Nelson Hall. Lyn Solomon submitted a proposal to the Finance committee and the Vestry.

We have addressed numerous issues this year:

- We did some maintenance on the labyrinth to reset bricks and add stone dust
- With the construction project on the mission house we had to coordinate and repair some lighting out front and the sprinkler system
- The Sacristy had a makeover with paint and strip/re-wax of the floor
- Classroom one received a makeover to create a warm welcoming space for children
- We received an estimate to submit to the insurance company for some unfinished damage to the men's bathroom from the water damage a couple years ago
- Plymouth Sign is restoring our sign out front
- A railing, stair treads and a gutter have been installed for the Thrift shop
- Mark Baker painted the Nelson Hall trim
- Estimates are being gathered to repair the Sanctuary floor where the two foundation slabs come together
- A beautiful lit flag pole was donated and installed in the front of the property
- We had two trees removed to prevent damage in the courtyard
- Bob Fennell has removed the bluestone to prepare for cement
- Robert B. Our worked on our parking lot to regrade & drain away our pond effect after rain

A tornado in July damaged the roof and downed two trees along the south driveway entrance. Church Insurance repaired both the roof and the driveway.

Thanks to the generosity of the Community Preservation Grant, the Pond family, and so many of our volunteers for the remaining funds and work needed, we were able to finish the foundation project on the Mission House and move the thrift shop and offices back in. The work was accomplished by George Davis, Inc. We will have

a second phase of the project to complete the second floor exterior of the building.

The monthly Property meeting will meet the second Tuesday of the month at 4:00 p.m. All are welcome.

CAPE AND ISLANDS DEANERY

Becky Alden, Lyn Solomon, Bernice Winthrop, Marilyn McMillan and Andi Taylor participated in Cape and Islands Deanery Assemblies in 2019.

At the January 6 meeting, we met the Rev. Canon Kelly O'Connell, Canon for the Southern Region who will be focusing on transition ministry, clergy health and wellness, and lay leadership and support for 56 parishes in four Deaneries. Hilary Greene talked about Disaster Preparedness. Every parish needs a coordinator and the diocese offers training. She also talked about the Asset Map she is developing which lists the ministries and resources each parish is able to share and is a great way to be connected to other parishes.

On March 14 we got updates from Diocesan Council on mission initiatives with planting trees at BCH Camp, with Indaba groups starting up, and with reaching out to young adults more creatively. Canon O'Connell reported that in the Southern Region over half the parishes have part-time clergy, and 17 clergy are presently in transition. Dean Pannell said an investigation is going on concerning embezzlement at BCH Camp. There have been more disciplinary actions taken concerning misconduct. The bishops are encouraging #metoo conversations. Rev. Stephen Voysey, Treasurer of the Diocese, gave an entertaining talk about the process of assembling a budget for the diocese each year.

May 18 we accepted grant requests for Amazing Grace Camp, St. David's Paper Pantry, and a Stokes Loan for St. Mary's Provincetown. Dean Pannell shared a concern for financial and congregational viability of a number of parishes throughout the diocese. Deacon McMillan introduced new global mission grants. We received Narcan Training. We shared fliers about upcoming workshops: Safety and Security for Places of Worship at St. Barnabas and Connecting Faith and Science for a Healthy Planet at St. David's.

September 19 Sue O'Brien gave a presentation on the Royal School of Church Music. Marilyn McMillan and Holly Hartman gave a short presentation on Global Mission. We held a brainstorming session Equipping the Saints - about making the Deanery work better to meet parishes needs. Asset mapping and website designing were some topics that came up.

CHURCH SCHOOL

The Church School "Catechesis of the Good Shepherd" has completed one full year of spiritual exploration and joyful learning. 12 different children have participated in the Montessori model of education. This method allows the child experiences which to learn at ones own pace in an age appropriate manner. The focus is both mystical and practical. Classroom one (the Atrium) has been transformed into a new environment. The walls are now painted in pastel colors. New furniture and rugs are in place. The bookshelves are filled with Montessori materials. There are multiple books and maps. There is a miniature prayer table and altar. The room is filled with sculpted figures and dioramas of Christ's life, His parables and teachings. There are multiple activities for biblical prayer and personal exploration. In "practical life" activities may include: folding, matching, serving and sorting. There is a washing station and opportunity to work with gentle cooking activities.

Highlights and diversional events of the year included: an indoor winter family picnic with movement and pantomime. Geoff Heins served as the resident magician! In the pouring downpour of rain on Easter Sunday our children hunted for hundreds of candy filled eggs in the courtyard. In the 10:00 am Mother's Day Sunday service, children participated by reading, ushering and serving. This practice was successful and may become a regular event next year. In addition to making wreaths during the Advent season, families and other participants enjoyed a new type of pageant. Participants donned celebratory head bands of angels, shepherds, animals, stars, trees, etc. and enjoyed interacting with Rev. Andi as she read a Christmas story to us.

Special thanks to our creative supporters in the church. Lin Taber constructed our altar, book cases, architectural models and environments of historical events. John Hays generously donated beautiful African musical instruments which we have used in processions. Our Easter event could not have occurred without the help of Nora Monteiro-Hunt and her daughter Piper who washed all the Easter eggs after the hunt. Also thanks to the newcomers who stuffed the eggs.

We had two meetings to educate parishioners about the program. I very much need a classroom helper and fellow catechist in the months to come.

DEACON REPORT

This past year my deep appreciation grew greater than ever for this loving and energetic community of faith. It's such a privilege for me to serve as the deacon of this parish. So many parishioners are deeply engaged in bringing issues and needs of the world into the life of the church, while also reaching out into the wider community and beyond it to serve. You can read about many of those efforts in the other contributions to this Annual Report.

This year, parishioners have led us to learn more about and take actions in areas as diverse as racial reconciliation; the climate crisis; hunger and poverty relief; LGBTQ+ pride and inclusion; immigrant and refugee rights; and prison ministry. We've partnered with other parishes in our diocese and with area groups in several of these efforts. With help from us, for instance, a new Paper Pantry opened at St. Peter's Episcopal Church-on-the-Canal in Buzzard's Bay. St. David's thus makes the primary role of the deacon – to be a bridge between the needs of the world and the commitment of the church – such a joy! A famous quote of Mahatma Gandhi's resonates for me: "There go my people. I must hurry to catch up with them, for I am their leader."

The standard text in the Letter of Agreement for a Parish Deacon in our Diocese describes a deacon's leadership role in general: "Jesus is the model for the servant leadership a deacon is called to exercise in a variety of ways, including encouraging and enabling others to serve. A deacon has one foot in the world and the other in the church." The section of that Letter that's specific to my role at St. David's starts this way: "We envision the deacon teaching, preaching, and inviting parishioners into ministries of the broader church."

During Epiphany last year, we embarked on a study of The Way of Love, the Practices for a Jesus-Centered Life. These practices are an initiative of the entire Episcopal Church to develop our individual and collective capacities to faithfully follow Jesus. The seven practices, as shown in the diagram, emerge from and are grounded on the Cross:



TURN: Pause, listen & choose to follow Jesus.

LEARN: Reflect on Scripture each day, especially Jesus.

PRAY: Dwell intentionally with God each day.

WORSHIP: Gather in community to thank & praise God.

BLESS: Share faith and unselfishly give and serve. GO: Cross boundaries, listen deeply, & live like Jesus.

REST: Receive the gift of God's grace, peace & restoration.

You can find more about these practices on the websites of our diocese (diomass.org) and of the Episcopal Church

(episcopalchurch.org). One of my favorite moments on my first mission trip to Cuba last fall was discovering the same diagram, for "El Camino de Amor," posted at the Episcopal Cathedral of Cuba in Havana. The transformative possibilities are world-changing!

St. Teresa of Avila, the revered Spanish mystic and theologian of the 16th century, once prayed: "Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which Christ looks compassion onto the world. Yours are the feet with which Christ walks to do good. Yours are the hands through which Christ blesses all the world."

Striving with all of you to be disciples in the Way of Jesus is truly an Alleluia! experience for me.

DIOCESAN CONVENTION REPORT

The 234th Episcopal Annual Convention was held on Saturday November 2, 2019 at the Back Bay Convention Center.

- Elections were done electronically for the numerous committees that are part of the leadership of the Episcopal Diocese of MA.
- The delegates approved the 2020 Diocesan Budget.
- The following Resolutions were voted upon:
 - ♦ The convention resolved to engage young adults fully in the life of the church.
 - Supported an effort that all persons sentenced to life-long prisons in MA be given the opportunity to seek Parole starting at 25 years.
 - Affirmed "An Episcopal Vision for Christian Care" of Presiding Michael Bishop Curry and the Episcopal Church to take the Creation Care Pledge.
 - ♦ The Diocese will become a Safe Haven.
 - ♦ The Diocese also takes up the Presiding Bishop's invitation to the Way of Love.

DYECH CARING CARDS

St. David's is one of 19 participating churches, banks and other small businesses in the Dennis/Yarmouth area that make up DYECH (Dennis/Yarmouth Ecumenical Council for Homeless Prevention). This group was founded in 1994 with the one goal to raise funds to be given to Housing Assistance Corporation in Hyannis to help prevent homelessness. Since its beginning, DYECH has given around \$1,595,500.00 to HAC for this purpose. Over the years, we have held yard sales, silent and live auctions, golf tournaments and ham and bean, spaghetti and chicken pie dinners. These have all gone by the wayside as our manpower has decreased. The easiest way for us to raise money is through the sale of food and other miscellaneous cards where we receive 5 per cent or more of the face value. We have cards for just about every grocery store on the Cape with the exception of Market Basket, Whole Foods and Trader Joe's. Even if you go to those stores, at some point you must go to the Stop & Shop, Shaw's, Dennis Public Market, Ring Bros. or Peterson's. Also, we sell cards for many businesses we all frequent, i.e. CVS, Dunkin Donuts, Dairy Queen, Cape Cod Creamery, Starbucks, Subway and Domino's and Wendy's. Come on, everyone can use some of these cards and they give us between 5 and 8 per cent.

Now the not so good news. The sales for St. David's in 2019 were \$75,700. This is down \$30,000 from 2018 when we sold \$105,645. We have to do better. Our contribution to HAC for 2019 was \$3,785.00 based on our total sales at 5 per cent. I believe we are all eating!!!!! Why aren't we buying more cards to help out a cause. It doesn't cost you a cent, but sure makes you feel good knowing you have helped out!!

We sell these cards after both services on Sunday. Don't walk by our table without stopping and taking a look at what you could use. They do not expire and you have them in your wallet when you're ready to use them (or they make a great gift). Once again, the easiest way to end homelessness is to prevent homelessness....and you can help.

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY

Anna Heaney, Julia Johnson, Bernice Winthrop, Nick Heaney and Beverly Saccocia are taking EFM at St. Mary's Episcopal Church, Barnstable. Currently the participants include one mentor; three people in Year 4 -- Theology; one in Year 3 — History of Christianity; one in Year 2 — New Testament; and three in Year 1— Old Testament. Class meets on Monday evenings from 5pm until 8pm (4:30 - 7:30 during the winter months). Discussions are lively and thought provoking.

Please consider taking this wonderful four year program which is a certificate program run out of the University of the South, School of Theology, Sewanee, TN.

ENVIRONMENTAL AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

Last year our committee settled on the committee name above. We are focused on local environmental issues, climate change and social justice initiatives. We accomplished the following actions in 2019:

- Produced and presented a community forum in May called: "CONNECTING FAITH AND SCIENCE FOR A HEALTHY PLANET AND A HOPEFUL FUTURE."
 We had two speakers, Dr. Wayne Walker from Woods Hole Research Center, and Rev. Deborah Warner, from Church of the Messiah in Woods Hole. The forum was moderated by Susan Starkey from the Faith Communities Environmental Network. We had about 75 attendees, many of them from other faith communities.
- Continued working with Buildings and Grounds on choosing a potential provider for solar energy at St. David's. Solar Rising was chosen and their proposal was reviewed by the Vestry and then sent on to the Finance Committee for further review and recommendations. This project is still under review.
- In June, we discussed goals for the Faith Climate Environmental Network (FCEN) of Cape Cod as well as goals for Saint David's. We agreed to continue pursuing solar energy for the church, continue our educational efforts on Climate Change, and to maintain a bulletin board on current environmental issues. The bulletin board is located temporarily in the common room and is being updated regularly. In addition, one of our members writes short informational messages on environmental issues for the weekly Sunday announcements.
- In August, our committee began developing and hosting "Fourth Sunday
 Forums," with the goal of providing education in relevant environmental and
 social justice topics. In September, we had a guest speaker, Mark Gabriel, from
 the Cape Cod Coalition for Safe Communities. He spoke about immigration
 issues on the Cape and upcoming state legislation affecting our immigrant
 communities.
- In October, we hosted a screening of the movie. "Call of the Forest: The Forgotten Wisdom of Trees." We also offered a group outing to see the play "Crude" being performed at the Cape Cod Theater Company.
- We rang our church bell on September 20th at 11 am along with 25 other faith Cape communities to support the climate change initiatives happening that day. St David's nursery school children rang the bell, with help, for 11 minutes.
- In November, Andrew Gottlieb, **Executive Director** of the Association to Preserve Cape Cod (APCC). Spoke about water quality issues on the Cape.
- Nick Heaney and Deacon Marilyn are exploring the possibility of forming a church-centered social group for young adults (20 and 30 somethings).

We are always looking for new members so please consider joining us the second Tuesday of each month.

Happy 2020 and welcome to a new decade. We've survived – and flourished – in 2019.

We started the year on a bright note as Colleen Weston agreed to come on board as Assistant Treasurer. She jumped in eagerly, and quickly learned all the intricacies of finances at St. David's. She's a great help and a joy to have as a partner in this journey.

But we couldn't do it without our accomplished Financial Administrator, Elie Harmon. She keeps all the day to day details in order and keeps things running smoothly. Besides being a skilled bookkeeper, she is a delight to work with. Thank you Colleen and Elie. We make a great team!

It's been a challenging year financially, with a lot of ups and downs. The Mission House project was still ongoing and, as with any construction, extra expenses popped up. This meant the Thrift Shop couldn't open until mid year. The town denied us use of Nelson Hall for events – so that expected revenue didn't happen.

But when the Thrift Shop opened...it just flew. It met our expected annual income in just 6 months! Amazing. The Christmas Fair, the yard sale, and the concerts all brought in more than we expected. And pledges/plate income were on course.

We again qualified to receive the Pond Fund grant of \$25,000 which we used toward the Mission House

We were blessed with several bequests this year from parishioners who wanted to see the good work of St. David's continue. The vestry voted to use these bequests to fulfill the mission of St. David's – and split the money between DIT accounts for repairs and cash reserve so that we have the means to meet future and Special Ministries to fund our outreach.

Although we again had a deficit and had to use some DIT funds, we are hopeful for this year and the future. We have exciting things happening and it takes money to accomplish our mission. We need all to continue to participate. *Wendy F. Katz, Treasurer*

FOOD BASKET

The food collected each Sunday is delivered to the Cape Cod Council of Churches "Hands of Hope Food Pantry" in West Harwich. They ask for items frequently requested but not provided free of charge or at reduced prices from the Boston Food Bank. It serves people who meet the U.S. income poverty guidelines and have proof of residence in the towns of Harwich, Dennis, Yarmouth, Barnstable, Mashpee and Sandwich. Participants may visit twice a month and receive three to four grocery bags of food.

We received **3497** food items in 2019, an increase of 583 over last year. We received the fewest items in May but we also had a Mothers' Day collection for "A Baby Center," another Cape Cod Council of Churches' program which helps mothers in need. The emphasis was on diapers of which we collected 914. We also provided wipes, creams, lotions and clothing. In addition, \$192.00 was donated to the Food Pantry.

The second Sunday of each month is **"FOCUS SUNDAY"**. Everyone is encouraged to bring a particular item that day. However, in November, we had "FOCUS FOUR" when we collected Thanksgiving Dinner items on each of the four Sundays before Thanksgiving. We received 400 food items and \$600.00 worth of Food Cards for turkeys and other needed items. Both these numbers are BIG increases over last year.

Many thanks go to all of you who collect, count and deliver the food to the Food Pantry and thank you also to those who support this important ministry. It is amazing what we can do together! *Respectfully submitted, Elizabeth Rixham*

PAPER PANTRY

Thank you Becky Alden, who took on the role of Paper Pantry Administrator for most of 2018. I volunteered to take on this role in March of 2019, and quickly learned "the ropes" from Becky and other regular volunteers,

This year, the need for our pantry was evident. We averaged 52 visitors each month representing an average of 150 family members/month. We saw a substantial increase to 60 clients in November and December each. New sign-ups for 2019 accounted for 97 total new clients. The number of family sizes ranges from 1-7 individuals.

The pantry spends an average of approximately \$400 each month. This represents paper, toiletries, and other personal care products purchased. We purchase paper towels and toilet paper wholesale from the Cape Cod Paper Company, and usually purchase other items from our local Dollar Tree.

Parishioners continue to donate money and many of the supplies we need, and we are grateful for all donations. In December, a donation of hats and gloves allowed us to contribute one item or more to each visitor. The St. David's Thrift shop donated one free item of clothing to each visitor in November and December.

Our Special Ministries Team continues to support us with their quarterly outlays which totaled \$1860 in 2019. We applied for a Deanery grant of \$2,500 and are awaiting word on the outcome. Working in conjunction with the Take Away meal program, we applied and received two grants from Cape Cod Five and The Cooperative Bank of Cape Cod.

I am proud that Deacon Marilyn McMillan, the wardens Richard Banks and Debbie Hays, and our amazing staff kept worship, Lenten programs, and Mission House projects going in my absence.

One of the most difficult days was when the town told us to stop all rentals of Nelson Hall. We had to call families with scheduled events and tell them they needed to book a new venue, some with less than a month's notice. God bless Karen Conner who worked so hard and was so professional in helping families move forward. This was happening just as we were in the throes of getting the Mission House ready to be re-occupied, and preparing for a bishop's visit with confirmations and receptions. Add to the mixture a host weekend for our Indaba partners and our first participation in Pride Day.

It was a miracle that we were ready for Bishop Alan Gates to bless the Amos Baker Mission House on July 14, and then nine days later we got hit by the tornado that whipped through Yarmouth. Luckily the damage was minimal, only two uprooted trees along the driveway and half a three falling on the roof over the Common Room area. Many thanks to the prompt attention from Church Insurance and the generosity of St. Boniface Church in Sarasota which paid our deductible of \$1,000. Trees were removed within 36 hours and the drive and roof are better than they were before.

TAKEAWAY MEAL PROGRAM

During 2019 we provided a free meal to 686 clients who represented 1,634 adults, 246 children for a total of 1,880 meals served. The monthly meal that is served on the third Wednesday of every month consists of a main entree such as chicken, ham, turkey, pork etc. along with a vegetable which is usually a potato dish, such as, scalloped potatoes and a dinner roll. Members of the parish generously donate brownies and cookies while another member donates a piece of fresh fruit. A great group of volunteers helps to prepare, package and distribute the meals.

The number of clients and total meals served is up significantly from prior years. For example, in year two we served 543 clients a total of 1,523 meals. Some of the meals go to assist parishioners in need and families who utilize the St. David's Daycare.

Funding from St. David's, St. David's Special Ministries, St. David's parish members along with grants from Cape Cod 5, The Coop Foundation, Retired Men's Club of Cape Cod have helped ensure the success of the program. These funds are used to purchase the food items that have not been donated along with needed packaging materials. Trader Joes has generously donated paper bags for the clients to take their food home. The Yarmouth Food Pantry has started donating bread products. The Thrift Shop has been providing coupons for a free item to the clients which are highly valued by all.

The Barnstable County Health Nurse and the Dental Hygienist have been well received by the clients and very much appreciated by all. We continue to seek services that could be added for the benefit of the client base.

In 2019 we have experienced a significant increase in the number of clients and meals served. We will be seeking ways to control the costs of each meal served and ways for funding this valuable community outreach ministry.

THRIFT SHOP

The Thrift Shop opened for business on Wednesday, June 19, 2019, but it actually began months before. A steering committee of six to eight dedicated members met regularly beginning in September to decide on hours of operation and to develop a mission statement and work procedures booklet. We decided to change the hours from 10 to 3pm, to 10 to 2pm which enabled us to get by with fewer volunteers.

In the late Winter, early Spring, Andi put out a call for painters, scrapers, tapers, cleaners to get the Mission House ready for occupancy by the office staff as well as the thrift shop. As the work was being completed, we notified parishioners that we were able to accept donations. Many parishioners had been saving up donations for over a year.

Once the donations began coming in, the next task was to transform the spotless, spacious basement and turn it into a well- organized, well thought out work and storage space. In no time at all, the basement became full. We have sections for each type of home goods, i. e., linens, lamps, small wooden furniture, bric-a-brac, jewelry, antiques, pots, pans, dishes, clothing, purses and shoes. We are constantly working to keep aisles clear for safety reasons. With some of the heavier rains recently, we discovered that one of the new windows has a leak, and the ensuing flooding has caused us to discard wet items. The proper people have been notified and we await resolution.

The Thrift Shop is totally volunteer run. We have 22 volunteers; the majority are year round, fewer are here only in summer and 3 are subs. Volunteers are responsible for accepting donations, storing, sorting, cleaning, presenting and pricing merchandise. All of us work at what needs to be done for the benefit of the customer. While one or another may be more focused on clothing or housewares, everyone is allowed to make decisions on pricing, staging, placement of items, etc. Our volunteers are always ready and willing to step forward when an opening appears in the schedule.

We have been meeting regularly between 10 and 2pm on the first Tuesday of each month to catch up on cleaning, sorting, rearranging, pricing, etc. Anyone is welcome to show up, even if not a regular volunteer or if just curious. We have tasks that can be performed while sitting, and we have people who will carry items up and down the stairs for those who can't.

In November, for Thanksgiving, we gave each person attending the Takeaway Meal a coupon for one item of clothing, free of charge. 25 were used, and as our base price is \$4.00, that represents a minimum of \$100 given back to the community, part of our mission. People were allowed to use their coupons on any item, even coats, jackets and boutique items. One woman walked into the shop, looked at a hand knit red and white sweater on display and said, "I want that." The smile on her face was contagious. Another came in without a coat and left, smiling, wearing a warm winter jacket. We decided that day to continue giving out these coupons

each month. How many people can say they sell "smiles!" It's our mission to help others, and in the process, we end up benefitting as well.

Our volunteers are some of our most loyal, dedicated customers. They get first glance as new items come out and can purchase them at our regular low prices. Part of the fun of working there is the camaraderie between the volunteers and also between them and the customers. It is a happy, positive atmosphere with lots of laughs. After all, we sell "smiles."

Below, find the income we have registered for each month since our opening on June 19th, 2019. Using the Square for credit purchases is helpful in accommodating customers, but it recently came to our attention that these receipt-less sales have confused the totaling procedure. Do we include the charge total with the cash and checks amount or not? In capturing the daily sales figures, it was impossible to discern whether the charge amount had been included with the total. Therefore, the amounts below are close but not necessarily accurate. An email will go out to all volunteers with an explanation to avoid this problem in the coming year. Exact figures for the Thrift Shop are available through the Treasurer's report.

2019 VESTRY MOTIONS

February 16, 2019

The Vestry of St. David's Episcopal Church, 205 Old Main Street, South Yarmouth, MA on the 16th day of February, 2019, after discussing the amount to be paid to Rev. Andrea S. Taylor duly made, seconded and adopted the following resolution:

- The Rev. Andrea S. Taylor shall receive a salary of \$49,870 and a housing allowance of \$38,400 for the year 2019.
- The housing allowance shall be so designated in the official church records.

April 27, 2019

(Mission House) A motion was made and passed to approve the expenditure of funds to cover the costs of \$7,850.00 for Phase 2 projects which included AC Condensers, bulkhead basement door, 3 basement electrical outlets and basement air vent and return. Source of funding will be funds remaining from the project.

A motion was made and passed to have a 25 foot flagpole installed with motorized mechanism for raising and lowering the flag and theft prevention; a solar light so the flag will be illuminated at night; that the flag pole hold only the American flag and that permanent medallions for the Episcopal Church and the rainbow would be affixed to the outdoor signage.

May 18, 2019

A motion was made to accept the \$125,000 recently received by St. David's from bequests from Marjorie Jones and Susan Reid and to allocate the funds from each bequest as follows:

- One third of the funds allocated to Special Ministries.
- One third of the funds allocated to Cash Reserve Fund.

• One third of the funds allocated to the Maintenance Reserve Fund. The motion was seconded and after discussion, the motion passed.

A motion was made to create a default allocation of unrestricted bequests as follows:

- One third of the funds allocated to Special Ministries.
- One third of the funds allocated to Cash Reserve Fund.
- One third of the funds allocated to the Maintenance Reserve Fund.

The motion was seconded and after discussion, the motion passed.

A motion was made to allocate \$500 from the funds recently allocated to the cash reserve fund to compensate Karen Connors of Epic Events for her work helping clients who had booked Nelson Hall find other locations for their events. The motion was seconded and after discussion, the motion passed.

A motion was made to accept the recommendation of the Diocesan Investment Trust to put new deposits into DIT at the new ratio (65/35) stock to income fund. The motion was seconded and after discussion, the motion passed.

A motion was made to permit Wendy to work with our DIT advisor to re-allocate our current portfolio into the new ratio (65/35).

The motion was seconded and after discussion, the motion passed.

Iune 15, 2019

A motion was made to approve the use of up to \$6,000 from the Horton Flower Fund in our unrestricted DIT funds, for landscaping around the Mission House. The motion was seconded and after discussion, the motion passed.

A motion was made to pay legal fees up to \$1500.00 (whatever they might be) from the recent bequests allocated to the vestry's discretion fund. The motion was seconded and after discussion, the motion passed.

July 20, 2019

A motion was made to approve the use of \$4,900.00 from the Jones and Reid bequest funds to pay for the costs of the street-side steps and the Thrift Shop walkway of the Mission House. The motion was seconded and after discussion, the motion passed.

October 19, 2019

A motion was made that the Vestry vote to override the requirement of three bids to repair the storm damaged and other damaged places in the driveway.

The motion was seconded and after discussion (particularly about whether or not there would still be funds to address the back walkway which the Town had said we must fix for safety reasons), the motion passed.

WARDEN'S REPORT

Throughout 2019 St. David's initiated and completed several projects, participated in many programs, faced several problems all of which challenged, tested and strengthened the parish itself.

The projects undertaken throughout the year all helped to maintain or restore the facilities, grounds and operation of St. David's. Those projects included the completion of the work on the Mission House to allow the offices and staff to occupy the building and the re-opening of the Thrift Shop. These two projects alone called for many hours of prepping, priming, painting, packing and unpacking. The many projects included patching holes in the driveway to help ensure the safe passage of people and vehicles. The removal of the large tree in the courtvard was completed in order to enable us to meet the requirements of the town for having a stable and secure walkway. In addition to the tree removal, the stumps that were in the courtyard were ground down to prevent the soon to be installed new concrete walkway from being destroyed by the root system. Another attempt at draining "Lake St. David's" was made with the hope that drainage will be improved and parking spaces restored. A beautiful walkway to the Memorial Garden was installed to enable those with mobility challenges to more easily visit the garden and participate in services. Ongoing projects such as weeding the Labyrinth, property clean-ups, cleaning of Nelson Hall and the Sanctuary made certain that members and visitors were always made to feel welcome in His house.

The programs held throughout the year, such as Coffee with God and House Church helped us to bond with fellow members of the parish while programs like Indaba helped us to bond with members of other parishes in the Diocese. All of these programs helped us to bond spiritually with each other and with Him. Catch The Spirit and Bring a Friend to Church are implemented to further bond us to the parish and the communities in which we live. Programs were also implemented to make us more aware of the need for us to be stronger stewards of the environment and each other. Then there are the wonderful concerts, the Summer Fair, Christmas on Old Main, the Cookie Stroll to name some of the projects we have undertaken to help generate funds to support the operation of St. David's. In addition, there are the programs designed to give hope and encouragement to those in our community who struggle day to day with many emotional, physical and spiritual issues. The Paper Pantry and TakeAway Meal program, Special Ministries, the many programs held in our facilities that we continue to support that help members of the community recover from addictions. One major program that is still under review and consideration that has required extensive study and research is the possible installation of solar panels on the buildings to help reduce our carbon footprint.

A few of the problems encountered in 2019 included (and who can forget) the damage caused to our grounds and building by the tornado that hit the Cape. We also encountered a problem with how we utilize Nelson Hall that prayerfully has been resolved so that we can once again offer it for use by people outside of St.

David's. Another was the walkway in the courtyard that the Town of Yarmouth indicated was not safe due to the slate being pushed up by the root system of the nearby trees.

There were also the wonderful efforts undertaken by individuals and couples who undertook projects such as weeding, planting bushes, baking goodies, donating treats and fruit for others to enjoy. These projects were often done behind the scenes with much appreciation from all for what was done.

The common thread throughout all of the projects, programs and problems, that enables us to persevere and to complete and conquer the projects and challenges we face is the people of St. David's, who with their devotion to Christ, strive to serve as His disciples and that is what will ensure our future for generations to come.
