

56th ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES - January 29, 2023

The 56th Annual Parish Meeting of St. David's Episcopal Church took place in person (and via YouTube) on January 29, 2023.

The following Vestry members and officers were present: Rev. Andi Taylor; Wardens Bill Lickfield and Debbie Hays; Vestry Members George Armstrong, Linda Cranmer, Nick Heaney, Wendy Katz (Treasurer), Jim Logan, Nora Monteiro-Hunt, Steve Mulligan, Janis Rennie (Clerk), Colleen Weston (Assistant Treasurer). Absent: Tom Kuebler, Janet Cardillo, Kent Steinnagel.

There was a quorum as 75 parishioners were present. (The YouTube video had 7 viewers.)

After a hymn, the Collect and scripture readings, Rev. Andi Taylor, recalling recent readings from Acts in Bible Study and reflecting on the Beatitudes in today's Gospel, asked us to consider all the times we've heard "Here I am." in scripture. When we say "Here I am.", that's the meeting point; it is in those moments that we find connection. Sometimes God is challenging us and we rise to say, "Here I am!" to answer His call. Other times, it is us, in need, calling God and saying, "Here I am."

Bill Lickfield called the Annual Meeting to order at 9:19 a.m.

Rector's Report:

Andi said St. David's is a place where we say, "Here I am." During the recent difficult years, we have been flexible and resilient in serving one another. Andi cited the many contributions our parishioners make to each other, the Yarmouth community and beyond (Food Pantry, DYECH Cards, TakeAway Meal, Paper Pantry, Thrift Shop, etc.).

We are blessed that David Angelica led a group of parishioners in the course *From Life into Life* in July, agreed to be on our masthead as Priest Associate, and will cover Andi's sabbatical. The Spiritual Formation Group continues to keep our feet to the fire addressing racial justice (and as other congregations may not be addressing this, we need to invite others to join in our efforts). Finally, Andi is looking forward to the pilgrimage (8 members going) to Wales celebrating the 900th anniversary of St. David of Wales' canonization.

As we continue to say

"Here I am." to God.

"Here I am." to community,

"Here I am." for whatever work is put before me....

we face a two-part challenge to make sure our ministry continues. We need to increase legacy gifts and strengthen our ability to welcome those who walk in our door. "Here I am." St. David's is a place where we belong and can be of use in God's service.

Andi then invited new members to the front of the church as well as anyone who wished to reaffirm their commitment to St. David's mission - striving to be disciples in the Way of Jesus by loving, serving and healing in the name of God.

After the Prayers of the People and The Peace, the meeting continued.

Acceptance of Minutes: The minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting, as written in the Annual Report, were accepted.

Warden's Report: The Warden's Report can be found in the Annual Report. Debbie drew everyone's attention to the hats on the ends of the pews, which symbolize the many hats parishioners wear.

Treasurer's Report: Wendy Katz gave the Treasurer's Report, which can also be found in the Annual Report. Wendy thanked the Assistant Treasurer Colleen Weston and Financial Administrator Elie Harmon. She explained that the Pond Fund has made our recent outside capital improvements possible. Regarding the 2022 report, Wendy said we had expected more of a deficit but had more income than expected and were frugal with our expenses. However, fixed expenses will go up and she encouraged anyone with an idea to increase our income (such as the successful

Valentine Cookie Sale initiated last February) to talk with a Vestry member. We are hopeful that our solar project will move forward and that we will be renting Nelson Hall more often. The Treasurer's Report and the 2023 Budget, as approved by the Vestry, were both accepted.



BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS



The B & G committee presented and "Ongoing Work" list to the Vestry at its March meeting. This list included a new Nelson Hall kitchen floor. The scope of that work included removal and replacement of the subfloor and replacing the floor surface. It also included uninstalling, removing, returning and reinstalling all kitchen appliances. This has been completed. There is also research being done on purchasing a motorized projection screen as well as a light blocking device for the large octagonal window. For the Main Building, Kent Steinnagel and Don Blackwell replaced the lever door handle on the exterior door entering the kitchen area of the Common Room with a push bar exit device. The

double glass red doors exiting the Common Room into the courtyard are scheduled for replacement. They have been ordered. Windows, doors and shingles on 2/3 of the building have been replaced. Mold, in the basement, resulting from a boiler leak, was removed by the Mold

doctors. This was covered by insurance. The bell was removed, repaired, and refinished. Thank you Kent for your work on this. Also, Ken Elliott was a key player in this project. At the writing of this report, we are awaiting the reinstall of the bell. Our prayer is that it will be rung on Easter Day! While the Grounds portion of Buildings and Grounds is constantly changing, some of the projects that were completed include the addition of three handicapped parking signs added between the main building and Nelson Hall and shrubs to the left of the Parish Office were trimmed which made for better visibility





from the street as will as the Handicapped parking signs being more visible. The solar array project is still on. We continue to request updates. It appears that the Historic Committee is the current obstacle. Unfortunately our landscape volunteer work force has "aged out" and we have had to turn to our landscaper. We do, however, hope to hold a spring clean up. Our Memorial Garden is in need of a caretaker. We have had a couple of folks come to trim the grave markers. That is appreciated. Bill and Tami Lickfield have done this for a number of years. They are willing to walk through the process with any interested person or persons. Don Blackwell. Warden

CAPE AND ISLANDS DEANERY

We approved a \$3037 House of Mercy Grant for Amazing Grace Camp (with any residuals going to them) and Sending Serving Grants of \$2000 for St. David's Take Away Meal and Paper Pantry, and \$2000 for the Holy Spirit, Orleans, Food 4 Kids program. We also accepted a \$100,000 Green Loan application from Grace Church, Vineyard Haven for solar panel construction on their rectory and church. In March we discussed the Invite, Welcome, Connect book that was distributed at the 2022 Convention. Robin Ward and Andi Taylor also led a zoom course on the book for a broader diocesan group from Jan-April. In May we discussed Bishop Gates' retirement announcement, and learned about Grandmothers against Gun Violence. Officers were elected. Co-Conveners: Rev. COOKIE STROLL

On December 9th over 400 people visited St. David's as part of the annual cookie stroll held by the South Yarmouth Library Association. Over 700 tickets had been sold for this major event. While we did not distribute cookies we did serve as a rest stop, trolley stop, parking area and offered a lunch for purchase. In addition, some of the cookie distributors utilized the kitchen at St. David's to bake their treats for the strollers.

With the recent greening of the Sanctuary coupled with the singing of the choir, along with beautiful creches on display by members of the church people definitely left with a wonderful feeling of Christmas. Hot cider and hot chocolate with candy canes galore added to the festive nature of the church.

Although the fire was not lit due to the warm temperatures of the day, people were invited to sit and relax and to partake in a light lunch of half a turkey/ham and cheese with lettuce and tomato sandwich, a bowl of corn chowder and a bag of chips. Soft drinks were also available for purchase.

The March Room had been transformed into a nicely decorated cafe where the strollers gathered to enjoy the food and the company of others. Due to the large number of people looking to enter there was a waiting line. Perhaps next year we should use Nelson Hall for the luncheon site. Funds from the sales of the items covered the costs of the items and there were funds left over to support St. David's. In addition, it is suggested that a large sign be placed directing people to the luncheon area and that the time for the choir be adjusted to reflect when choirs at other churches are singing. This year the Trolley pulled right into the driveway stopping in front of the doorways to the Common Room. This brought large numbers of people to us. Pamphlets and news letters of services, events and activities were also distributed to the strollers with encouragement to return and see us again. Many strollers also went to the Thrift Shop to purchase holiday items and other fine things. There were several trays of cookies leftover from the sites people visited. DIOCESAN CONVENTION REPORT

The 238th Annual Convention of the Diocese of the MA was held on October 27th and 28th at the Doubletree Inn in Andover, MA. Those in attendance were Becky Alden (Friday and Saturday), Robin Ward and Rev. Andi Suess Taylor on Saturday only.

The Diocesan Budget for the 2024 year was approved in the amount of \$9,024,117. This amount is \$4,225 less than the 2023 budget. Our Parish Assessment for 2024 will be \$34,465. The prior year was \$32,135. This is an increase of \$2,330.

A Resolution recognized The Rt. Rev. Alan M. Gates', 10th and FINAL Annual Convention. He did remind us that he will still be our bishop until October 19, 2024.

The Standing Committee proposed and passed a Resolution allowing for the Election of the New Bishop of the Diocese on May 18, 2024.

A Resolution was proposed and approved to continue OUR COMMITMENT to RACIAL JUSTICE in the Episcopal Diocese of MA. It was also urged by the Racial Justice Committee that the Budget Committee of the Diocese of MA allot at least \$20,000 per year for the Cathedral Staff Anti-Racism Training beginning with the 2025 Budget.

Another Resolution was proposed and approved to establish a Healthy Congregations Task Force for clergy, lay leaders, and parishioners of our Diocese. This Task Force will include mental health professionals.

It was Resolved that the REPARATIONS FUND will be a long term commitment by our Diocese that will promote "repair for all and redress for those who have been harmed by the institution of American Slavery and its legacies." This committee will be comprised of African American and Afro Caribbean communities of Eastern MA.

A Resolution was proposed and approved in response to the Convention Address by The Rt. Rev. Alan M. Gates, THAT WE WILL BECOME MODELS OF PEACEFUL RESPECT; that we will CONDEMN VIOLENCE in our state of MA, in our country of the USA, and in the World; that we WILL EXTEND COMPASSION, OFFER AID as needed, and PRAY for ALL PEOPLE of DIFFERENT FAITHS.

An Amendment to Canon 14 was voted upon. It states---Organizations of Parishes, Missions, AND INTENTIONAL EPISCOPAL COMMUNITES will be given seat, voice and vote at Convention. This amendment was the most interesting, taking nearly an hour for discussion and vote . Respectfully submitted,

DYECH CARING CARDS



It certainly seems that the years roll by quickly. It is again time to report on how we did with the DYECH Caring Card sales at St. David's. I remind you that DYECH is made up of most of the churches and some small businesses in Dennis and Yarmouth. We all try to raise funds to give to HAC (Housing Assistance Corporation) for their Homeless Prevention Program to keep folks in their homes.

We raise funds through our effort in selling "Caring Cards," where a percentage of the sale comes back to DYECH. This program is a "no brainer." as we are all purchasing groceries and we all know how much they have increased. I have noticed that a lot of you folks who used to

purchase \$100 worth of cards, are now purchasing \$200. We all have seen the prices go up and the size/volume of the products reduced.

Again, our objective is to give HAC funds for their Homeless Prevention Program. Many of their clients need some temporary help to remain in their homes. That's where we come in!

Over time, a lot of the fund-raising events we used to have no longer exist. Do you remember the ham and bean suppers with apple pie for dessert? They were great and we made lots of money having them. Like everyone else, we have lost a lot of our "worker-bees", who used to run these events. Our contributions to DYECH now come solely through the sale of our cards.

In 2023 our Caring Card sales at St. David's totaled \$72,705.00. At an average of 5% per sale, that means we gave HAC about \$3,630. Add to that the \$600 we made from the successful Christmas Gift Card Sale we had in December, and that totals \$4,230.00. No one even "broke a sweat" raising those funds, and HAC was MOST appreciative. So, I remind you that we are all purchasing groceries, why not do that with a Caring Card from Stop & Shop, Shaw's, Ring Bros., Dennis Public Market or Peterson's Market. (We also have cards for many other businesses that you may use). We sell these cards after both services on Sunday. We would love to see some new folks purchasing cards and knowing they are helping a wonderful and necessary program. Thank you for all you do for others.

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY

FINANCE - TREASURER'S REPORT - 2023

Well, we've made it through another recovery year from Covid. Welcome 2024!

I always have to begin by thanking the rest of the finance team. It takes a team, and we've worked well together these last 5 years to kept things rolling along. Elie Harmon does the hands on bookkeeping and Colleen Weston is my invaluable assistant. Thank you both.

Our exterior siding and window project has been ongoing thanks to the Pond Fund grant and individual contributions, as well as tapping some savings we put away for just such projects. The Pond Fund is a grant for capital projects that we apply for annually, and has been crucial for our renovations. The campus is looking beautiful!

We ended the year again with a deficit, but it wasn't as bad as we had anticipated. So that's the good news. We cover this by withdrawing money from our invested funds. The goal is to withdraw less than what they increased in value so that we don't deplete the funds. Our overall income was up. Pledges were down somewhat, but I'm amazed at the results of the hard work of the wonderful Thrift Shop staff and Christmas sale volunteers – Incredible!

Although there are some expenses we have no control over, everyone has been very careful with spending to try to keep our expenses in check. We're a frugal group, and try to cut costs wherever we can. Utilities have risen this year so we'll have to keep trying. We're hopeful that the solar project will be finalized soon, and that will help immensely with increased income. The costs to keep this beautiful campus running are high, but amazing things happen because we're here.

All of what we do for the community and beyond is because of the financial support we get from you through your pledges, gifts, and support of our events. St. David's has always been known as the "outreach church" and we can't do it without the family of St. David's. Thank you for all you've given and done – and keep up the good work.

PILGRIMAGE TO WALES



Eight members of St. David's went to Wales in the last week of May to celebrate the 900th Anniversary of St Davids Cathedral (this IS how they spell it)as an official pilgrimage destination. We flew to Dublin, took in the Irish Emigration Museum, caught the train to Rosslare, spent the night and hopped the ferry to Fishguard at the crack of dawn. We arrived at St Davids in time to freshen up for Evensong, followed by trivia night in a local pub. The next day

we took a tour of the cathedral and library with curator Mari James. She read the Pentecost passage from Acts 2 from the 1588 Welsh Bible! That night we heard a concert of the Pembrokeshire Schools' Orchestra and Choir with the BBC National Orchestra of Wales that premiered a piece about "The Jabberwocky." The next morning, some pilgrims took a boat expedition to see puffins and seals, while others rested or hiked to Whitesands Beach. In the afternoon, we enjoyed a private tea with three Choral Scholars, the Director and Assistant Director of Music, followed by a BBC National Orchestra of Wales concert. On Pentecost Sunday we enjoyed the voices of the Choral Scholars at the cathedral's main service. The afternoon was a time to eniov the many shops in town. Our final day at St Davids was a



Medieval Fayre at the Bishop's Palace which we took in after a hike to St. Non's Chapel and the Well of St. Non. The rector and her spouse remained in Wales as the pilgrimage group returned



home again via bus, ferry, train, cab and plane. Our Pilgrims shared their experiences during the Sunday announcement time once they were back at St. David's, South Yarmouth. Steve Mulligan spoke about the shared leadership of our devotion time as a group. Every night we gathered for Compline, led by each pilgrim in turn. He enjoyed drawing from BSA resources he knew about as a Scoutmaster.



Kent Steinnagel recalled his awe that St Davids Cathedral has had daily devotions sent up to God within those walls for over 1,000 years. It made him wonder how we can make sure the next generations are going to be able to share the experience we have of knowing Christ in our daily lives. Nancy Black noted the sense of community she felt, traveling as a group, counting heads all the time. She loved meeting the Choral Scholars, the Music Director and Assistant for some informal conversation. She was amazed that the congregation sang so loudly from hymnals that had no notes - only words.

Janet Cardillo shared her surprise that the huge cathedral seemed to have been built in a crater, with an outdoor staircase of 39 steps just to get from the main street to the front doors. (It was designed to be hidden from Viking invaders.) She felt so trapped and disabled until she met a kind taxi driver, Frank, who got her to all the events on time and even gave her a complimentary ride to see the beach. She credited her fellow pilgrims with the kindness of 7 angels, helping her with luggage and encouraging her to enjoy some walking around town. Marsha Fredericks described the beautiful Welsh countryside, with clear blue skies, meadows taller than people and new types of plants we had never seen before. She loved having a few days in Ireland before the pilgrimage and hopes to go back for more fun in both places another time.

Judy Lundsten talked about the bees of St Davids and the new beehive sculpture called "Do the Little Things." Legend has it that St. David gifted a hive of bees to St. Aidan, because *twice* Aidan's bees had followed their favorite monk back to Ireland. There is a matching sculpture at St. Eden's in Ferns, Co. Wexford, Ireland.

"Do the Little Things," is the last thing St. David said – and that's exactly what bees do!

RECTOR'S REPORT



SCHOLARSHIP REPORT

The Scholarship program was begun in 1984 by two parishioners who were retired teachers and who volunteered at the Thrift Shop. They sold their personal items through the Thrift Shop specifically to start a fund to aid those members of the parish who were continuing their education. Annual appeals brought contributions from individuals, including two bishops, until we received two sizeable bequests. Specific criteria have been established to qualify.

These scholarships are awarded to parishioners who have reached the age of 18 and are continuing their education either through college or other programs. They are also awarded for summer programs such as camperships for those under age 18. It's a wonderful program to assist those in pursuit of continuing their education.

The committee was delighted to award a total of \$13,100.00 this year to the applicants, continuing the legacy begun in 1984.

For example, the Wednesday Book Group expressed an interest in knowing more on how the Red Cross relates to international events specifically wars and conflicts. With the assistance of Becky Alden an hour program was presented after church and followed by a soup and bread lunch. Sacred Ground alums met and worked in groups to recommend next steps for this work around racial justice and equity. Most recently, discussion focused on Epiphany and Lenten activities. The Spiritual Formation Committee meets on third Wednesdays at 10 am in the March Room, in person and via Zoom. TAKEAWAY MEAL and PAPER PANTRY

The Paper Pantry and TakeAway Meal Programs in calendar year 2023 provided meals and personal hygiene products to over 2,844 people. In 2017 we served 1626 people. It is clear from these numbers and conversations with other groups, that the number of people in need on Cape Cod has dramatically increased. We are blessed to be able to effectively respond to this increased need and equally blessed by the support of the members of St. David's and community organizations for the time, talent and wealth that is shared with us throughout the year. In the earlier days of these programs we would consider serving 50 attendees a large number. Now we regularly serve 70 plus attendees each month.



Attendees at our programs are often seen taking public transportation, walking, riding bicycles, car pooling and driving their cars to obtain the items we provide. There are several families that we deliver items to each month. Every month, volunteers work to ensure that each attendee receives food and personal care items for themselves and their families. Family size varies from one to six adults and many families have children. We now have a back up inventory of canned food for those who may arrive when the main meal items have been depleted.

During the course of the year we try to offer special meals that reflect the time of the year. At Easter we serve ham, at Thanksgiving turkey and at Christmas both ham and turkey. In March we serve chili to

remember the first meal we served in 2017. In other months we serve a complete meal with BJs roasted chicken as the main course. We also offer alternative items for people with special dietary restrictions.

Paper Pantry distributes personal care products such as body soap, toilet paper, paper towels, toothpaste and shampoo. Other products distributed at special times include toothbrushes, deodorant and Kleenex. Adult incontinence products and feminine hygiene products are available upon request. First time attendees receive extra items.

We collaborate with The Cape Cod Commercial Fishermen's Alliance to provide Chowders; Stop

and Shop for bread items; Cape Cod Food Network for financial support and food items; Flower Angels for flowers at special times of the year; Barnstable County for surplus food items; South Yarmouth Library Association Annual Cookie Stroll for cookies; and Stop and Shop for fundraising throughout the year.

Equally important are the Dental Hygienist, the Public Health Nurse and the County Nutritionist. Having these services available has afforded the attendees to receive much needed dental care; flu shots; health check ups and information on making good dietary choices. Unfortunately the Dental Hygienist will not be providing services in 2024.

We received financial support from the Cape Cod Deanery; Cape Cod Times Needy Fund; the United Way; the Hunger Food Network; The Retired Men's Club of Cape Cod; the Yarmouth Rotary Club; the Homeless Fund and the John B. Tew Fund of the Cape Cod Foundation. We also receive food and financial support from members of St. David's and friends of St. David's. A prayer of thanksgiving is also made for the generous donations received throughout the year for the continued support provided by Special Ministries of St. David's. A special prayer is also extended to the individual who purchases the fruit each month.

In 2024 we will be resuming the registration process of the attendees so we can obtain



demographic data to be used for applying for grants. We stopped gathering this data when Covid forced us to alter our processes.

As you can see, the need for items has more than doubled, and the need for your help and assistance has increased substantially. We need brownies on Monday mornings, helpers on Tuesday afternoons to bag the personal care items, and helpers on Wednesday mornings to finalize the food prep. Please contact us to learn more about assisting with these Ministries.

2023 VESTRY MOTIONS

January 21, 2023

A motion was made and seconded to approve the budget for 2023 as amended. The motion passed.

A motion was made and seconded that Rev. Andrea S. Taylor shall receive a salary of \$51,000 and a housing allowance of \$38,900 for the year 2023. The motion passed. The housing allowance shall be so designated in the official church records.

February 18, 2023

A motion was made and seconded to accept the Parochial Report. The motion passed and the report was signed.

March 18, 2023

A motion was made and seconded to authorize the expenditure of up to \$8,500 from DIT to re-do the kitchen floor. The motion passed.

April 15, 2023

A motion was made and seconded to spend up to \$150 to install a push bar on the Common Room door that leads out to the parking lot and the Mission House. The motion passed.

A motion was made and seconded to allow the expenditure of up to \$1,500 to get a professional cleaning of the appliances and equipment before they are moved out of the kitchen for the floor replacement. The motion passed.

August 19, 2023

After the July meeting and before the August meeting, a motion was made, seconded and voted upon via email to disperse funds for the shingling and window replacement projects. The motion passed:

A motion was made and seconded to spend up to \$60,000 to complete the work on the church of replacing windows, shingles and fascia boards up to the double doors in the Common Room on the courtyard side. Funds to come from the Gift Card Campaign and the \$25,000 from the Pond Fund gift.

October 21, 2023

A motion was made and seconded to close the Mutual Aid Network Fund (created during the Covid shutdown) and to transfer the \$580 balance into the Rector's Discretionary Fund. The motion passed.

December 16, 2023

A motion was made and seconded to use up to \$9,000 from non-operating funds to replace the two red doors in the Common Room with new doors with panic hardware. After discussion, the motion passed.




